Impact Investing – Defined*

- Socially-responsible investing (SRI), a portfolio construction process that attempts to avoid investments in certain stocks or industries through negative screening according to defined ethical guidelines
- Environmental, social and governance (ESG)
 investing, which involves integrating ESG factors into
 fundamental investment analysis to the extent that they
 are material to investment performance
- Impact Investing involves investing in projects or companies with the express goal of effecting mission related social or environmental change


Impact Investing and Donor Engagement

- Greater community impact in multiple sectors
- Generational shift/donor demand
- Competitive positioning vs. commercial DAF providers
- Broader trend advancing practice of impact investing

Donor Engagement – Majority (62%) of impact investing CFs actively engaged donors. Those who are not currently active plan to in the near future.







SVCF Capital Preservation Pool

- Stable value cash pool seeking competitive financial returns
- Up to 50% may be laddered into insured deposits through CDARS
- Up to 5% in non-insured deposits at top performing CDFIs
- 100% of deposits are with local CDFIs and community banks
- 0.50% 1 year return through July 31, 2017

Individually Managed Funds Various Impact Investing Strategies

- IMF 1 Low carbon, fossil fuel free portfolio advised by Merrill Lynch
- IMF 2 Passive equity with ESG overlay managed by Northern Trust
- IMF 3 Passive equity with custom screens and ESG tilt at Aperio and Parametrics
- IMF 4 Up to 5% of private equity allocation in direct, seed-stage venture capital


Customized Philanthropy Services Mission- and Program-Related Investments

- Fee-for-service offering for due diligence and administration
- Initial due diligence and funding billed at staff hourly rates
- Legal expenses, if applicable, billed to donor's fund at cost
- \$600 annual fee for ongoing administration and monitoring
- Donor profile: high net worth with staff or financial advisor, but lacks capacity or know-how; corporations with private foundations

Examples (20 to-date):

- Eye Fund, PRI, \$500,000, subordinated debt eye hospitals
- Root Capital, PRI, \$75,000, subordinated debt microfinance
- Lumni, PRI, \$25,000, convertible debt student finance
- Notable Labs, MRI, \$100,000, Series A preferred stock cancer
- Vital Farmland, MRI, \$150,000, limited partnership sustain ag

Our Program's Evolution

- Social and Responsible Investing
 - Addition of SRI pool in 2010
 - Investments considered based on one or more ESG criteria
 - Historically good performance
 - \$73M in that pool after 7.5 years
- Move into Community Impact Loans
 - 2013 Board of Trustees approved using \$1M of Foundation reserves
 - Loans made in line with our priority program areas
 - Impact Investing Committee was formed to set strategy, and review and approve loans.



Our Program's Evolution

- Donor Involvement
 - Raised \$300K in gifts and co-investments
 - Created Impact Investing Pool for donors
 - Also participating in projects as they arise
 - Denver Social Impact Bond
 - Greenline Small Business Capital Fund
 - Made PRI's from donor-advised funds
 - Several members of Social Venture Partners-Denver came together to make a loan to one of their grantees and are looking for other projects to invest in
